## **QUESTIONS FROM FACULTY**

#### Q: When is the next wellness day?

Wednesday, April 7 is Penn State's third and final wellness day of the spring semester. More information is available <u>here</u>. On wellness days, no class meetings will happen (unless the faculty member has received an exemption) and no assignments are due.

#### Q: Can visitors still come to campus?

## LATEST NEWS OF IMPORTANCE TO FACULTY

- Penn State's <u>COVID-19 Dashboard</u> shows ongoing results for all COVID-19 tests administered on campus since December 19, 2020, for faculty, staff, and students.
- Penn State is strongly encouraging all students, faculty, and staff to sign up to get a vaccine as soon as they are eligible to receive one. Phase 2, which extends vaccine eligibility to all Pennsylvanians age 16 or older, will begin on April 19.
- President Eric Barron and guests <u>answered an array of questions from Penn</u> <u>State faculty and staff during a livestream about the University's response to the</u> <u>coronavirus</u>, employees returning to work on campus, health and safety of the community, and others topics related to the pandemic.

- Physicians at Penn State Health urge people to <u>continue to wear a mask and</u> <u>follow other COVID mitigation guidelines</u>, even if they have been vaccinated.
- Penn State students are serving as data collectors and data managers in a <u>nationwide research study to understand mask usage</u> on college campuses.
- Researchers in the College of Medicine found an <u>increase in the number of</u> <u>cigarettes smoked per day during the early months of the COVID-19 pandemic</u> by nearly a third of surveyed Pennsylvania smokers.
- Penn State Health, with the assistance of community organizations and local government officials, has provided pop-up vaccination clinics at locations in Berks, Dauphin, Lancaster, and Lebanon counties, specifically targeted to underserved communities.

## **KEY REMINDERS FOR FACULTY**

- <u>Students who completed quarantine and isolation at University Park are being</u> <u>surveyed</u> to collect feedback about their experiences.
- Over the past year, the <u>Manufacturing and Sterilization to Address COVID-10</u> (MASC) Initiative has mobilized to protect health care providers and communities across Pennsylvania.
- Spring 2021 Holiday/Special Events Testing Schedule
  - Friday, April 2: no random testing (all campuses); one walk-up testing site open (Pegula Ice Arena).
  - Saturday, April 3: no random testing (all campuses); no walk-up testing.
  - Saturday, April 17: no testing at Pegula Ice Arena or Beaver Stadium (Hintz Family Alumni Center and 101 N. Atherton St. open as usual for walk-up and random testing, respectively); testing at the Commonwealth Campuses remains unchanged.
  - Friday, May 7: no random testing (all campuses); one walk-up testing site open (Pegula Ice Arena).
  - Saturday, May 8: no random testing (all campuses); no walk-up testing.
- Walk-up COVID-19 testing hours at the University Park campus will continue as follows:
  - Walk-up testing at the Hintz Family Alumni Center will be available Monday through Saturday from 9 a.m. – 5 p.m.

 Testing availability will change on the dates listed above. More information is available <u>here</u>.

This walk-up testing is available to employees who are in the Return to Work database at University Park. Employees in that database also continue to have the option to do the opt-in mail kit testing.
