LATEST NEWS OF IMPORTANCE TO FACULTY

- Penn State's <u>COVID-19 Dashboard</u> shows ongoing results for all COVID-19 tests administered on campus since December 19, 2020, for faculty, staff, and students.
- Penn State's COVID-19 Operations Control Center has announced the <u>schedule</u> for <u>drop-in COVID-19 testing</u> at University Park through late June.
- In a new study, Penn State College of Medicine researchers found that <u>people</u>
 <u>living with HIV had a 24% higher risk of SARS-CoV-2 infection</u> and a 78% higher
 risk of death from COVID-19 than people without HIV.
- A recent survey by the Center for Survey Research at Penn State Harrisburg's Institute of State and Regional Affairs found that <u>many Pennsylvanians are</u> <u>"vaccine hesitant."</u>

KEY REMINDERS FOR FACULTY

- Penn State's COVID-19 Operations Control Center (COCC) has developed a <u>comprehensive COVID-19 mitigation strategy for the transitional month of May</u> <u>and the summer 2021 semester for all campuses</u> that includes vaccine consideration, masking, testing, contact tracing, and quarantine and isolation.
- The 2021 survey¹ from TLT regarding challenges students face during the pandemic found that 17% of students found differing layouts in Canvas challenging. To reduce this challenge during the upcoming semester, please remember to use the research-based guidelines for setting up Canvas to be effective for your students! (¹ Serpi, A., Robert, J. (2021). - Penn State scientists have moved rapidly to apply their expertise toward the development of complementary COVID-19 vaccine candidates.

- A team of researchers in collaboration with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention developed models that <u>project a sharp decline in COVID-19 cases</u> by July 2021.
- Gov. Tom Wolf visited the University Park campus on May 5 to join President Barron, head football coach James Franklin, and student-athlete Theo Johnson in urging Penn Staters and Pennsylvanians to get vaccinated for COVID-19.
- Acting Pennsylvania Physician General Dr. Denise Johnson visited the Regional Vaccination Clinic at the Bryce Jordan Center on May 3 to address vaccine hesitancy and encourage college students to get vaccinated before the semester ends.
- As instructors return to campus this fall with ideas for updating their courses based on the lessons they've learned over the past year, a new resource has been developed to introduce research-based indicators of quality. The <u>Course</u> <u>Design Quality Check</u> provides a short list of ideas for assessing quality, and is accompanied by a 2-hour workshop for instructors who wish to discuss ideas in their own disciplinary context.
- The COVID-19 pandemic, which caused an almost immediate shift to remote learning in March 2021, <u>dramatically changed the way CAS100 was taught</u>.
- COVID-19 vaccines may cause <u>temporary swelling of the lymph nodes in the armpit in the same arm that was injected</u>. This is normal and expected says Shelley Tuzzato, chief technologist for outpatient imaging at Penn State Health Lime Spring Outpatient Center.
- The <u>Regional Vaccination Clinic at the Bryce Jordan Center has resumed operations as scheduled on Thursday, May 6</u>, offering both the two-dose Moderna vaccine and the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine. May 6 through 10 will be the final week that the clinic offers the first dose of the two-dose Moderna vaccine. Starting May 13, the clinic will only offer the second dose of Moderna and the single dose J&J vaccine.
- Walk-up testing is available to employees who are in the Return to Work database at University Park. Employees in that database also continue to have the option to do the opt-in mail kit testing. Walk-up COVID-19 testing hours at the University Park campus will continue as follows:
 - Walk-up testing at the Hintz Family Alumni Center will be available Monday through Saturday from 9 a.m. – 5 p.m.
