Instructor resources for the election

In advance of the upcoming elections, two offices in Undergraduate Education have prepared materials that provide guidance about how to talk with students about the upcoming elections, how to encourage students to vote, and how to incorporate these conversations into classes.

The Office for General Education <u>materials</u> connect voting as a civic obligation to the <u>Social Responsibility and Ethical Reasoning Learning Objective</u> in the General Education curriculum, which aims to develop in students "the self-knowledge and leadership skills needed to play a role in creating and maintaining healthy, civil, safe, and thriving communities." The Schreyer Institute for Teaching Excellence developed a <u>guide to teaching through the election</u> that provides instructors with a number of resources for both the pre-election and post-election periods.

Deadline soon to respond to research faculty survey

A new Broader Impacts (BI) committee is <u>reviewing current BI resources</u> and making recommendations for how the University can enhance the impact of research activities and the competitiveness of research proposals to federal agencies. Faculty are urged to complete a <u>research faculty survey</u> by October 31 to suggest ways that the University might better support them in the area of BI.

Accessible syllabus templates

The IT Accessibility Group and the Schreyer Institute for Teaching Excellence have produced an <u>accessible syllabi template repository for instructors</u>. The <u>templates</u> use best practices for accessible Microsoft Word documents; these documents can also be adapted to other materials in a course.

Red Folder

The Red Folder, which supports University faculty, staff, and student leaders in helping distressed students, has been <u>updated and reprinted for fall 2022</u>.

AC22 revised

Effective October 3, 2022 <u>policy AC22</u>, <u>Search Procedures for Academic Administrative</u> <u>Positions</u> was revised to reflect the changes proposed by the University Faculty Senate at their most recent meeting. The revisions are consistent with the 2020 revisions to <u>AC13</u>, <u>Procedures for Hiring Full-time Faculty</u>. Like the revision to AC13, the revisions to AC22 reflect Penn State's current practices and strategic goals and add specificity to various aspects of the search process.

Rock Ethics Institute Faculty Fellows

The Rock Ethics Institute is now accepting applications for its <u>2023-24 Faculty Fellows</u> <u>program</u>. REI fellowships provide up to \$10,000 for a two-course release from teaching to support ethics-related projects by Penn State faculty. Fellowship applications are due November 1.

Administrative Fellows Program

Applications are being sought for the <u>Administrative Fellows Program for 2023-24</u>. The program offers Penn State faculty and staff the opportunity to work with senior University officers to gain insight pertaining to the challenges of leadership in the academic community. Mentors for 2023-2024 will be the Executive Vice President and Provost, Vice President for Human Resources, and Vice President for the Commonwealth Campuses. An information session will be held via Zoom on Friday, November 4 from 1:00-2:00 p.m.

President's Award for Excellence in Academic Integration

Nominations are being accepted for the <u>2023 President's Award for Excellence in</u> <u>Academic Integration</u>, an honor recognizing faculty members at the rank of professor who have exhibited extraordinary achievement in the integration of teaching, research or creative accomplishments, and service. The deadline is January 14, 2023.

Penn State Laureate nominations

The University is seeking nominees for the role of <u>2023-24 Penn State Laureate</u>. Nominations are due by Friday, December 9.

October Faculty Senate meeting

At its <u>October 18 meeting</u>, the Faculty Senate passed a package of interrelated updates to the University's general education policies and undertook two items of business intended to make the senate's governing documents and meetings more accessible and easily understood.

Faculty Passings

Jay Precht, associate professor of history at the Fayette campus, <u>passed away on</u> <u>October 1 at his home</u>. Dr. Precht had been at Penn State for 12 years. During his time at Penn State, he served on the University Faculty Senate.

Christopher C. French, director of the Trial Advocacy Program and professor of practice at Penn State Law, <u>passed away on September 10</u>. French taught Torts, Trial Advocacy, Evidence, Contracts, and Insurance Law for more than eight years, in addition to regularly publishing books and law review articles.

Clifford Maurer, lecturer in information sciences and technology at Penn State Berks, passed away on September 29. He had been employed at Penn State for 21 years and most recently taught security and risk analysis courses.
