## **FAQ: Teaching Effectiveness**

My fall semester SEEQ results had a lower response rate than my past SRTE results. What can I do to increase the response rate for this semester's SEEQs?

Discussing the SEEQ with your students may help increase your response rate.

- Remind students that the SEEQ is not available during the last week of class for 15-week courses.
- Review the new questions with students
  - Questions are narrow and focused, so answers can be short (no paragraphs necessary!)
  - Questions are designed to elicit constructive feedback for the instructor
- Be sure to communicate how you have incorporated past student feedback into the course
- Consider providing students time in class to complete the SEEQ

#### **Upcoming changes for Fall 2024**

- At instructors' request, SEEQs will be available after the Late Drop period, which shortens the availability to Weeks 13 and 14.
- The MSEEQ will be administered for the first time in fall semester 2024, not spring 2024 as originally planned.

## **COVID Extension Deadline Approaching**

April 1 is the deadline for tenure-line faculty in the penultimate year of their probationary period to accept a one-year extension to their probationary period due to COVID-19. By completing the online form "Confirmation of Extension of the Probationary Period Due to COVID-19," the faculty member's probationary period will be extended by one year. ## Faculty Senate January and Special February Meeting Updates

During its <u>first meeting of the spring semester</u> on January 23, the Faculty Senate heard updates from Penn State leadership engaged in conversation on the future of the University. Topics included the budget, a new business approach, and the academic program and portfolio review (APPR). At a <u>special meeting on February 14</u>, the Senate voted to pass a nonbinding "Agreement of Shared Governance Cooperation" as well as a proposal for several Senate committees to give regular updates on the status of various initiatives.

# **Faculty Passings**

Roy Robson, professor of history at Penn State Abington, passed away on January 29. Robson joined Abington in 2015 as the division head for Arts and Humanities and professor of history with a special interest in Orthodox Christianity. His distinguished scholarly record includes three books and more than two dozen book chapters and journal articles. Read more about Robson here.

Andy Landmesser, associate teaching professor of information sciences and technology at Penn State Brandywine, passed away on February 12. Andy taught courses in cybersecurity, information technology, and security and risk analysis, and he was instrumental in launching the campus's cybersecurity analytics and operations major.

His impact on the Brandywine campus and its students went well beyond the classroom. In early 2023, Andy helped establish a National Society of Leadership and Success (NSLS) chapter on campus. He also built and fostered a rewarding relationship with several prominent companies, including SAP. In fall 2022, he was named the College of Information Sciences and Technology Statewide Faculty Member of the Year.

# Penn State Emerging Academic Leaders Program

Applications are now open for the <u>Fall 2024 session of the Penn State Emerging Academic Leaders (PSEAL)</u> program. The program fosters the growth of Penn State faculty members looking to enhance their leadership skills. <u>Applications are open through Friday</u>, March 1.

## **Campus Access and Success Grants**

Penn State faculty and staff are invited to submit <u>proposals for Campus Access and Success Grant (CASG) funding</u> to support projects that increase college access, facilitate college transition, and encourage college success for Pennsylvania students who wish to attend Penn State but may not have a typical academic profile due to socioeconomic disadvantages, under-resourced high schools, or systemic barriers. The submission deadline for the 2024-25 academic year is 5 p.m. on Monday, April 15.

## **Travel Awards Program**

Penn State Global has announced <u>Faculty and Staff Travel Awards for 2024</u>. These awards are given on a rolling basis and are meant to support faculty and staff travel related to developing or expanding collaboration with select Penn State global partner universities and organizations. These are current or developing strategic partnerships with multi-disciplinary and university-wide engagement across education, research, and outreach. All application materials must be received electronically via <u>the InfoReady portal</u> at least six weeks before the proposed travel departure date.

The Academic Program and Portfolio Review (APPR) steering committee invites faculty, staff, and students to nominate themselves or members of the community to <u>participate</u> in one of the emerging working groups that are essential to the project's success.
